War time vocabulary		
1	Invade	When an armed force enters a country with the intention of occupying it.
2	Occupy	When a military force takes over a country and controls it.
3	Munich Agreement	An agreement between France, Italy, Nazi Germany and Britain which tried to prevent Germany using military powers in return for the land it had taken in Czechoslovakia.
4	Axis Powers	The main Axis Powers were Germany, Italy and Japan.
5	Allies	The main Allies were Great Britain, France, the Soviet Union and U.S.A.
6	Neutral Countries	Some countries chose not to fight and stayed neutral. E.g. Ireland, Switzerland, Portugal and Spain (there were others too...)
7	The Blitz	Germany's aerial bombing campaign against Great Britain during WWII. It focused on densely populated cities (e.g. London and Coventry)
8	Evacuation	Britain moved its children away from the cities at risk of bombing in the Blitz to safer areas like the countryside.
9	Billeting officer	Billeting Officers were responsible for finding homes for the evacuees.

Important leaders during WWII		
1	Neville Chamberlain	British prime minister— May 1937—May 1940
2	Winston Churchill	British prime minister: May 1940—July 1945
3	Adolf Hitler	Leader of the German Nazi party throughout WWII.

Treatment of the Jews during WWII		
1	antisemitism	Hostility to or prejudice against the Jews.
2	Prejudice	Pre-conceive idea or opinion that is not based on reason or experience
3	The Holocaust	Period of history where millions of Jews were killed just for being Jewish.
4	Testimony	A truthful –spoken or written - statement about something that has actually happened.



Are people treated fairly in our modern world?		
1	Displacement	The forced movement of people from their home or country.
2	Refugee	A person who has been forced to leave their country in order to escape war, persecution or natural disaster.
3	Asylum	The protection granted by a state to a person who has left their home country as a political refugee.
4	Asylum seeker	A person who has fled persecution in their home country and is seeking safe haven in a different country, but has not yet received any <b>legal</b> recognition or status
5	Border	A line separating two countries.
6	Camps	A temporary settlement (of tents) built to receive refugees.
7	Immigrants	A person who comes to live permanently in a foreign country. This may be due to choice, not force.
